## Career Steps



Obtain your BSN and strongly consider obtaining a Master's Degree in Nursing with a focus on leadership.



Obtain your nursing degree as a registered nurse (RN) and pass the NCLEX exam. Obtain your RN license through your State Board of Nursing and begin practicing in pediatrics.



Seek your Certified Pediatric Nurse (CPN) credential from PNCB when you meet eligibility. As you grow in your pediatric care role, explore ways to get involved in management.



Seek out formal leadership development courses or cohorts offered by your organization.



Explore opportunities to gain leadership experience in your organization by leading a unit council, becoming a committee chair, acting as a charge nurse, or being an assistant nurse manager.
