Career Steps



Obtain your BSN and pass the NCLEX exam. Apply for RN licensure through your State Board of Nursing, then gain work experience as a pediatric RN.



Pursue either a PhD or a doctorate of nursing practice (DNP) with a research/evidence-based practice focus.



Seek your Certified Pediatric Nurse (CPN) credential from PNCB.



Participate in research studies, translation of knowledge, and other scholarly activities (writing, publishing, presenting, grant writing, teaching evidence-based practice, etc.).



Identify a nurse scientist mentor in order to learn about the unique role and qualifications needed, as well as how to structure a program.

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Career Steps



After at least 1 year of experience as a pediatric RN, earn your masters (MSN) in a pediatric advanced practice nurse role from an accredited university. Pass your certification exam, obtain your APRN license, and gain experience in your new role.



Pursue either a PhD or a doctorate of nursing practice (DNP) with a research/evidence-based practice focus.



Gain 3 to 5 years of experience participating in and leading research and evidence-based practice.



Participate in research studies, translation of knowledge, and other scholarly activities (writing, publishing, presenting, grant writing, teaching evidence-based practice, etc.).



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
